
Enter our raffle and peruse our amazing stalls including; Ice Cream, Jerk Chicken, Face Painting, Cakes and Cookies and many more!

EYFS

Nursery



This week in nursery we have continued to enjoy or topic of 'Will you tell me a story?' This week we have shared the story of 'Little Red Riding Hood.' We have also been very lucky and enjoyed a very exciting visit from an author who read us their brilliant story- all of nursery listened beautifully for this session. Nursery have also become bakers this week, getting busy making delicious biscuits on Wednesday. We took turns to measure ingredients, mix all the ingredients together and decorate them too. In our maths learning we have been recognising numbers within our environment from 1-10. We have been working hard practicing our careful counting of up to 10 objects and even matching the numeral to this! We finished our week with an exciting number walk, seeing what numbers we could find around the school.

Reception

This week in reception we have enjoyed sharing the story of 'The Very Lonely Firefly', continuing with our topic of minibeasts. The children were able to retell and sequence the story, even writing their own versions! We have also had a very exciting delivery this week of the caterpillars! Each class has been closely watching the caterpillars and observing any changes over the week- we can't believe how much they have grown already! Next week we hope to see them transform into beautiful butterflies!

This week in our maths learning we have explored 3D shapes. We started the week by comparing the difference between 2D and 3D shapes. We have been focusing on: cube, sphere, pyramid and cylinder and naming their properties. To finish our week off we really enjoyed taking part in a Hungry caterpillar healthy eating workshop! Using fruit and salad the children all made their very own hungry caterpillars and got to taste them too!



Year 1

In Writing this week, Year 1 have worked hard to draft their very own non-chronological reports about the Gruffalo, ensuring to include a title, picture, subheadings and facts.

In Maths, the children have showed fantastic persistence when learning about time. Specifically, they have learned about "before" and "after", the days of the week and the months of the year.

In Goography, the children learned about the various features of a woodland, including trees, bushes.

In Geography, the children learned about the various features of a woodland, including trees, bushes, flowers, grass, paths and rivers. They then practiced applying this knowledge, designing and drawing a map of their very own woodland area.

In RE, the children have continued to learn about Judaism, this time focussing on Hanukkah. Specifically, they learned why Jewish people celebrate Hanukkah and what they do to celebrate it, including giving presents, eating special food and playing games.

The children have also had lots of fun in Art, recreating Vincent van Gough's "The Starry Night" using complementary colours and an "impasto" painting technique. We were so impressed with the children's persistence, taking their time to create small brushstrokes with thick acrylic paint.

Year 2

The last week in Year 2 has been very exciting. We had our 2 DT days at the end of last week, where we were planning, designing and creating beach buggies! We explored different materials to see what would work best, tested how to make sure our buggies would function, and then began to make them independently. We loved taking them outside and rolling them down the hill!



In Writing we have been using our imaginations to write incredible stories, all about the beach. We have seen sea monsters, terrible thunder storms, talking star fish, humungous sand castles and dazzling mermaids. We have planned and drafted the beginning, middle and end and are looking forward to publishing!

In Maths, we have been revisiting some prior learning, all about multiplication and division! We have been practicing our arrays, grouping and sharing, and applying this knowledge to super tricky word problems (some even with more than one step).



Year 3

This week, year 3 have been working very hard despite the hot weather and they should all be very proud of themselves. Our topic this term is rivers and flows. Therefore, in dance we have been using movement to represent rivers, rocks and fish. In science, we have been looking at different types of rocks such as Igneous, Sedimentary, and Metamorphic. We explored the differences between each type and how they are made.

In French this week, we have been focusing on different types of snacks and the children have enjoyed asking each other to practise their French vocabulary. Some of the children in year 3 were very brave this week and took part in auditions for the school talent show. We cannot wait to see the wonderful talent in the final show.

Year 4

Three weeks down already – we are nearly half way through! The children this week have enjoyed yet more developments in our text this term – The Indian in the Cupboard. Unfortunately, Little Bull has been injured by his trusty stead that Omri brought to life. Bleeding and fearing the worst, Little Bull looks to his new companion who jumps into action, brings to life a WW2 medic to save hi. Will he survive? Tune in next week to see what happens. English this week sees the children take on the topic of recount writing where they will be supplying their own recall to an event. Mathematics this week begins to look at understanding and plotting coordinates.

During our Thinking Inclusively, consideration of others' views and cultures has been main theme. RE has looked at how different religions worship their God or religious idols whilst comparing this to their own beliefs. PSHE has concentrated around how the human body changes through puberty and the various things that we should know regarding how to control and accept these changes both emotionally and physically. Staring the week with a whole school assembly regarding tolerance, we finish the week after applying this understanding to those around us and reflecting on how we have achieved being the best version of ourselves.



Year 5

It has been a busy week in Year 5. We started off the week with DT week and we used our knowledge of circuits and nets of 3D shapes to create our own pyramids with light.

In Maths, we are continuing our topic on time using the 24 hour clock. In English, we are finalising our playscripts based on chapter one of our book, Secrets of a Sun King. This week we are doing our final edit and publishing.

As a year group we are still enjoying our swimming sessions and making progress. We are more confident in the water and enjoy being there.

Some of us auditioned for the Talent Show and the level of talent in Year is unbelievable! There are definitely some stars to watch out for in the future!

In P4C this week, we have been looking at the question how has travel changed our lives. Within the next ten years, people may be able to travel between London and Sydney in just two hours by journeying through space on a suborbital flight. The current length of a traditional flight between London, UK, and Sydney, Australia, is at least 20-22 hours and usually entails a stopoff to refuel along the way. A sub-orbital flight involves launching a spacecraft to an altitude above the Kármán line (the boundary of space).
