#### EYFS

#### Nursery

This week in Nursery we have enjoyed reading the story of The Three Billy Goats Gruff. We started our week by reading this story in our outside area and re-enacting the goats walking over the mean old troll's bridge using the climbing frame! In Maths this week we have been recalling 2D shapes, focusing on circle, square, triangle and rectangle. The Nursery children had a brilliant idea to use lolly sticks to make their own 2D shapes, as well as going on a shape hunt. This week at forest school we had the best time celebrating mud week! We used the digging area and water butt to create lots of mud, to make mud faces on the trees. This activity was definitely enjoyed by all!

#### Reception

We have had another busy but exciting week in Reception. We are still eagerly watching our caterpillars who have now formed a chrysalis and are very close to hatching! We hope to see beautiful butterflies next week and to release them safely. In literacy this week we have continued our theme of butterflies and have been learning about their lifecycle. We have been busy sequencing the lifecycle and writing butterfly fact files. In Maths we have been getting Year 1 ready, focusing on our number bonds to 10. We are really beginning to deepen our understanding with number bonds, it has been wonderful to see the children use this skill independently in choosing time. To end our week, we have begun practicing for our sports day! We have some very exciting activities planned and all the children were so keen to try each one. Reminder-Reception's sports day will take place on Friday 7th July at 9am. Children to come to school wearing their PE kits with a water bottle.



#### Year 1



This week in English we read 'Where the Wild Things Are' by Maurice Sendak. The children started off the week by acting out the story in small groups, they really were wild! The children then sequenced the story on a flow map before drafting a diary entry as Max – writing about his amazing adventure. In Maths this week we started a new topic of time. We discussed the minute and hour hands and how to tell them apart. The children then looked at o'clock – using a clock to make the times. They then moved on to drawing the minute and hour hands themselves. After the children has explored o'clock, we moved on to exploring half past. We then compared times using the language of 'faster' and 'slower'.

In Science the children had a very exciting lesson! We used magnifying glasses to investigate the parts of a flower. After we discussed the functions of each part the children then drew and labelled a flower in their books. The children absolutely loved this hands-on lesson!

In Humanities the children looked back at their mini woodlands from last week and described the position of their features using 'north, east, south, west'. In RE we sequenced the key events in the story of Hannukah onto a flow map.

#### In English this week, we are designing and writing our own travel brochure to persuade people to visit the coastal town of Spiggy Holes, which is the class text we have been reading. The children have been working hard to use imperative verbs, (rhetorical) questions and amazing adjectives to entice the reader.

In Maths, we are consolidating previous learning and have been investigating mass in grams and kilograms. We have been using practical resources such as balance scales to compare the mass of objects, using mathematical vocabulary to describe whether objects are heavier or lighter than others.

We have also had rich discussions in PSHE and Science about the life cycles of humans and animals, and some of the different stages they go through when growing from offspring into adults. The children showed great understanding that these cycles occur as part of nature so cannot be changed.





#### Year 3

This week in year 3 we have been continuing with our shape learning, creating our own 2d and 3d shapes, and how to apply our knowledge to reasoning and problem solving. We have been getting on so well, and all the year 3 teachers are so proud! In Writing, we have been researching, planning and have just started to write our non-chronological report about rivers, which is linked to our humanities learning about the water cycle. We have been using beautiful handwriting, engaging sentence openers, and some fabulous vocabulary!

In PE this week, we have continued to practise for our sports day celebration, and enjoyed participating in relay races. In our Art lessons, we are continuing to look at colour and tone, and this week created water strokes looking at a creating and painting a variety of water stroke.

#### Year 4

WOW! End of the fourth week already! So, in this week's section of – The Indian in the Cupboard, Omri and Little Bull have been taking more and more things from around the house including Omri's dad's plant pot which has been noticed as gone missing. Is their time of secrecy coming to an end? Will Little Bull finally be exposed to the world? - tune in next week to see what happens. English this week continues with the children exploring recount writing and Mathematics has now finished our coordinates topic which leads us nicely onto consolidation work for the remainder of the term.

During our Thinking Inclusively, consideration of others' views and cultures has been main theme. RE has considered the various places where worship takes place and relating this to religious buildings they may see within our community. During this terms PSHE lessons, the children have been learning about changes that they will be experiencing as they move from childhood to adolescence and how to be supportive to others during these emotionally and physically exhausting times.



#### Year 2

#### Year 5

This week in Year 5, we have been working very hard completing some past SATs tests. It has been great to show off our learning from this year and what we need to continue to practice ready for Year 6.

We have also started a new genre in English. We are now writing a biography; we have looked at the features needed and what makes a good biography. We were able to interview our friends to gain an insight to then write about them which was really fun.



In Maths, we have been continuing our learning based on time. We can now convert units of time and solve lots of word problems.

During Guided Reading, we have been continuing to read Lilian's journey as she discovers more about Ancient Egypt and the mysterious jar left to her Grandad. We have been exploring the key vocabulary used and how words in different contexts can change the meaning of the word.

#### Year 6

This week Year 6 have started to undertake their DT project; using mechanisms and electricity to make a toy. The theme is around our currently Global Thinking topic "Ola Mexico". The children have been exploring how cams work, looking how different shaped cogs have a different impact on movement and have started to draw up designs for their own Coco (Disney) inspired moving toy. In addition, the children have drawn on their prior knowledge of circuits from science to include an electrical element. The biggest challenge lays for those who wish to use a motor to power their moving toy.



Alongside their DT learning Year 6 have been rehearsing their production. As a year group we are pulling together so that everyone will have a role to contribute to the production. From actor to prop design, from lights to make up. It will be the last resilient push for Year 6 to produce a production that will mean they go out with a bang!

#### Spelling Shed:

The top year groups this week are: Year 5, Year 1 and Year 3.

Our top spellers this week are Ruby (Year 5) in first place, Bisma (Year 1) in second place and Uzma (Year 3) in third place. On Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> Year 6 went to Bewl Water. It was a function packed day for all involved, even the bus journey was fun! The children were split into two groups to take part in laser tag and the aquapark.

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The laser-tag games took part within a woodland. Wearing their laser tag headbands, armed with their laser guns, the children went to war! A lot of fun was had both by children and adults taking part. (In my opinion the best game was the 'Doom' box where teams competed to take power of the box.)

Out on the reservoir, the aquapark was invitingly floating, waiting for the children to come bounce, slip and slide. Once 'wet-suited' the children took to the water to conquer their fears out on the water. A good time was had by all, many fears were overcome as the children rehearsed using their resilience and perseverance to tackle the many obstacles the aquapark offered.

Two days later, Friday 23<sup>rd</sup>, Year 6 re-boarded their buses, destination Leeds Castle. Go Ape was calling! Once again, all children were excited to use and overcome fears, this time up in the trees. It was remarkable, how every child gave the climbing a go at some level. Even most the teachers were up in the trees! It took a remarkable amount of bravery and grit to complete the courses. Year 6, well done!

All of the teachers involved commented on how pleased and proud they were of the behaviour of the children on both trips. The children were true ambassadors of NHCA, all being their best selves.

In P4C this week, we have been looking at the question what is bravery? Four children have been found alive after surviving a plane crash and spending forty days alone in Colombia's Amazon jungle. Colombia's president, Gustavo Petro heralded the rescue as a joy for the whole country. The four siblings were the only survivors of the plane that crash landed in the jungle on 1<sup>st</sup> May. They then became the focus of a massive rescue operation, involving soldiers and local people. Speaking of the incredible feat of survival, Gustavo Petro said, 'They were alone, they themselves achieved an example of total survival which will remain in history'.
